






Generic drugs are as effective as brand-name drugs




Generic drugs are as safe as brand-name drugs




I'd rather pay more for a brand-name drug than use a generic drug




Generic drugs are FDA or EMA approved, just like brand name drugs




Generic drugs cause worse side effects than brand name drugs




Have you ever asked your doctor if there was a generic alternative for a brand - name drug that he or she had prescribed for you?




Have you ever asked your pharmacist if there was a generic alternative for a brand name drug that your doctor had prescribed for you?




Are you currently taking any brand-name prescription drugs?




Has your pharmacist ever switched your prescription to a generic drug without discussing it with you or your doctor?




Generic drugs are less costly than brand name drugs



Do any of your brand-name prescription medications have a lower-cost generic alternative?




If generic alternatives for your brand-name drugs were available, would you switch to the generic alternative?




Have you ever taken a generic drug after using the brand-name version?




Suppose you were taking a brand-name drug and there was a generic alternative available. How much would you have to save on a single prescription refill in order to switch to the generic alternative?
